Seminar in Urban Problems	INTD 3584	<p>The URBAN SEMESTER PROGRAM offers students a tremendous opportunity for service learning and public service. For over 50 years, students from diverse backgrounds have participated in the program, enabling them to assist Hartford in addressing its challenges. Nowhere in the United States are urban challenges greater than Hartford, Connecticut – a city full of both need and potential, struggle and hope, rich with diversity and urban culture, poignant in its contrasts between wealth and poverty.</p> <p>Students intern in human service agencies, government offices, and community and non-profit organizations. Urban Semester students involve themselves in issues facing the city from education, poverty, homelessness, youth issues, and crime, to the challenges of the changing economy. They intern in school-related programs, shelters, advocacy organizations, political offices, state and local government, and many other settings. COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Online Offerings - Search for Online Hartford Offerings:


GEOG 2000 – Globalization (Rowan Kane): Globalization is foundational to our modern lives. This introductory, undergraduate course will focus on how Globalization impacts our economy, culture, politics, and environment. We will focus on the positive and negative effects of Globalization and discuss how policymakers are (successfully and not-so successfully) facing these trade-offs. In addition to understanding key terminology and concepts, students will be expected to provide their own critical thinking through regular responses to assigned readings, as well as essays.

SOCI 2651W - Sociology of the Family (Kim Price-Glynn): Families are potent symbols in the United States. We call a family home, "where the heart is," or "a haven in a heartless world." We signify a friend's importance by saying s/he is, "like family." Rather than conveying enduring truths, such distinctions convey significant meanings that change over time. This course explores how we construct families as well as the relationship between families and larger social forces. Drawing on course materials, we will first shatter common myths about families by confronting prevailing definitions and assumptions. Next, we will explore examples from our past as well as issues facing contemporary families. We will conclude by looking at families and social change.

SOCI 3601 - Sociology of Gender: (Kim Price-Glynn): Much of how we reproduce ourselves day-to-day is gendered. Our gendered lives often become visible in what may seem like trivial moments. Shopping for baby clothes provides a vivid example of gender as a binary (or two-part) construction; stores often have pink and blue sections corresponding to (who else) girls and boys, respectively. However, gender is not binary; gender exists in many forms and, as research will argue, gender is highly consequential in our social lives. Just consider how employment, education, and sports are gendered. This course explores sociological approaches to the study of gender. Given the multidimensionality of gender, we will pay special attention to the intersections of gender and race, ethnicity, sexuality, and class. Students will gain an understanding of overarching discursive and structural forces — economic, social, and political — as well as the micro-interactions of social actors that shape performances and understandings of femininities, masculinities, transgender, genderqueer, nonbinary, and a myriad of other gender identities.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Online Offerings - Search for Online Hartford Offerings:


GEOG 2000 – Globalization (Rowan Kane): Globalization is foundational to our modern lives. This introductory, undergraduate course will focus on how Globalization impacts our economy, culture, politics, and environment. We will focus on the positive and negative effects of Globalization and discuss how policymakers are (successfully and not-so successfully) facing these trade-offs. In addition to understanding key terminology and concepts, students will be expected to provide their own critical thinking through regular responses to assigned readings, as well as essays.

SOCI 2651W - Sociology of the Family (Kim Price-Glynn): Families are potent symbols in the United States. We call a family home, "where the heart is," or "a haven in a heartless world." We signify a friend's importance by saying s/he is, "like family." Rather than conveying enduring truths, such distinctions convey significant meanings that change over time. This course explores how we construct families as well as the relationship between families and larger social forces. Drawing on course materials, we will first shatter common myths about families by confronting prevailing definitions and assumptions. Next, we will explore examples from our past as well as issues facing contemporary families. We will conclude by looking at families and social change.

SOCI 3601 - Sociology of Gender: (Kim Price-Glynn): Much of how we reproduce ourselves day-to-day is gendered. Our gendered lives often become visible in what may seem like trivial moments. Shopping for baby clothes provides a vivid example of gender as a binary (or two-part) construction; stores often have pink and blue sections corresponding to (who else) girls and boys, respectively. However, gender is not binary; gender exists in many forms and, as research will argue, gender is highly consequential in our social lives. Just consider how employment, education, and sports are gendered. This course explores sociological approaches to the study of gender. Given the multidimensionality of gender, we will pay special attention to the intersections of gender and race, ethnicity, sexuality, and class. Students will gain an understanding of overarching discursive and structural forces — economic, social, and political — as well as the micro-interactions of social actors that shape performances and understandings of femininities, masculinities, transgender, genderqueer, nonbinary, and a myriad of other gender identities.

Urban Semester students involve themselves in issues facing the city from education, poverty, homelessness, youth issues, and crime, to the challenges of the changing economy. They intern in school-related programs, shelters, advocacy organizations, political offices, state and local government, and many other settings.
