Course Highlights

Hartford:

SOCI 3201, Methods of Social Research Instructor: Kim Price-Glynn

How can we distinguish good information from bad? One answer is to understand how research is produced. This course will focus on the central methods used by sociologists including surveys, interviews, observations, ethnography, content analysis, experiments, and applied research. We will lay a common foundation by evaluating the work of others. Students will also gain practical experience designing, and in some cases implementing, their own research through a series of in-class labs and independent assignments.

SOCI 2655, Sociology of Carework Instructor: Kim Price-Glynn

This course focuses on carework, or the paid and unpaid nurturance and reproductive labor that meets people's most fundamental needs. Carework scholarship has long documented the growing crisis in care – from unmet care needs around the world, and the effect of the devaluation of care on workers, families, and communities. Through this course, students will gain an understanding of the various forces that shape the social organization of carework through an examination of scholarly research, film/multimedia, and a recent memoir.

URBN 3998: Work and Economic Justice: Flyer

Instructor: Mary Donegan

Widening inequality defines our urban economic landscape. Too many workers hold dead end jobs with stagnant wages while the wealthiest among us benefit from astronomical income growth. Climate change, underfunded education, and geopolitical turmoil loom as threats, and trends in artificial intelligence, the gig economy, contract work, and working from home leave us with as many questions about our economic futures as solutions. In this class we'll ask: how are these forces changing work and the economy? Who is benefitting, who isn't, and how have these patterns shifted over time? How can policy help ensure the creation of good jobs for all? We'll study old and new policy solutions—from labor alliances and higher minimum wages to urban farming and universal basic income. And we'll ask how we can push for better workplaces, industries & policies.
